

## KALMIA

Mountain laurel or kalmia are beautiful, hardy, native evergreen shrubs that extend the blooming time into late June. They bloom heaviest in sunny conditions at the edge of woods. Planting with decayed pine-bark or needles, peat and a sprinkling of palletized- sulphur can be helpful as they like acidic well-draining soil. They should be protected from drying winter winds. -20F

<b>HEART OF FIRE</b>	Red buds open wide to a big pale pink flower on plant of vigorous upright growth. 1 litre	-20F	<b>\$12</b>
<b>KEEPSAKE</b>	Raspberry red in bud opening almost solid burgundy with white edge, outstanding foliage, American Nurseryman Plant of the Year in '98. 1 litre	-20F	<b>\$12</b>
<b>LITTLE LINDA</b>	Miniature with _-sized leaf, dense well-branched habit, red bud opens pink 1 litre	-20F	<b>\$12</b>
<b>MADELINE</b>	Only true double, rosy bud opens white with a few wine speckles, dense glossy foliage on upright plant to 8' 5 gal	-20F	<b>\$45</b>
<b>PRISTINE</b>	Chosen from S. Carolina woods for its abundant white bloom, diminutive extra thick leaf is drought and heat resistant but also cold hardy. Compact 3'X3' plant. 5 gal	-20F	<b>\$45</b>
<b>SNOWDRIFT</b>	White flowers on outstanding densely branched dark foliage plant	-20F	<b>\$12</b>
<b>TINKERBELL</b>	Similar to Tiddlywinks but is a more vigorous semi-dwarf that grows wider than tall with medium pink heavier textured bloom.	-20F	<b>\$12</b>
